PROJECT UDPATE

BODAWAY-GAP HEALTH CENTER March 5, 2019

In 2008, an *interim* Program Justification Document (PJD) and Program of Requirements (POR) were approved for the proposed Bodaway-Gap Health Center (BGHC) project for basic health services. The drafted PJD/POR placed the project on the National Indian Health Service (IHS) Health Care Facilities Construction priority list. The proposed project is for a 57,000 square feet health center, a helipad, staff housing and all infrastructure including a sewage lagoon.

In 2018, Congress appropriated \$10.2 million to finish the planning documents and design development. Finishing the planning document involves updating the drafted PJD/POR and the site selection evaluation reports (SSER) Phase I & II. On Jan 29, 2019 IHS issued the contract for SSER I and II. A revisit of the top three sites is scheduled with the contractor later this week; the top three sites were identified during the 2005 site selection evaluation process.

Once the planning documents are approved by IHS Headquarters; the Navajo Nation Department of Health (NDOH) Planning Office, Steering Committee and Navajo Area IHS will move forward with the Navajo Nation land lease application through the 164 signature process. While the land lease is in progress, the design phase will begin. The planning document update will take at least 14 weeks and the design development takes another 18 months.

The overall estimated cost for this project is \$98.4 million for the health center, 82 staff quarters and all necessary infrastructure. In 2018, the project received \$10.2 million for the planning document and design development, which is currently ongoing. The funding need is approximately \$88.2 million to meet the goal of completing this project (per the FY 2020 Annual Facilities Planning Five-Year Plan).

Although, three of the Navajo Nation projects could potentially receive construction funding prior to FY 2021, it is dependent on the federal funding allocation. New state-of-the-art health center facilities greatly improves access to health services and it elevates the health status of the Navajo people and other Native Americans in remote communities. It also contributes significantly to the Navajo economy by creating jobs for our Native people.

If Navajo Generating Station is sold to NTEC The Coconino County Board of Supervisors requests that local revenues are protected and included within the sale and operating agreement. If NGS closes the Coconino County Board of Supervisors requests Congress to authorize federal funding to minimize the socio-economic impacts from the closure of its federal facility Navajo Generating Station.

Option 1: If NGS is sold to NTEC The Coconino County Board of Supervisors requests that local revenues are protected and included within the sale and operating agreement. Indexing current revenues to inflation or the Consumer Price Index is essential to protect local revenue to deliver direct services.

Option 2: If NGS closes The Coconino County Board of Supervisors requests federal support to build economic diversification and resiliency in the region including: economic planning and development, broadband development, and educational attainment.

Background:

- In 1968 Congress passed the Colorado River Basin Project Public Law 90-537-authorizing the Federal government's
 participation in NGS in conjunction with creation of the Central Arizona Project. The Bureau of Reclamation manages
 the Federal 24.3 percent interest in NGS on behalf of the Secretary of the Interior under a 1969 delegation of authority.
- The Federal Government has a trust responsibility to the Navajo Nation. NGS was developed on tribal lands using
 tribally owned coal with the intention it would operate 70 years; instead the plant may close 25 years ahead of schedule
 which will deeply impact tribal communities and the regional economy.

Military Base Closure Assistance as a Model:

- Federal economic assistance to communities impacted by the Base Realignment and Closure (BRAC) includes planning
 and economic adjustment assistance provided by the Office of Economic Adjustment. OEA was established to mitigate
 against the effects of closure on local communities.
- The Base Realignment and Closure (BRAC) process requires facility reuse studies and community planning assistance.
- OEA also provides technical assistance to states and universities to help defense contractors transition to work outside
 of the defense space to make them more competitive on the commercial market.
 - o FY19 funding for the OEA was \$70,035,000
- The DoD recognizes that changes at federal facilities can negatively impact local communities and has created programs
 to mitigate those negative effects.
