President Allen Fowler Jr. – the money that you're asking about, they call it ear mark. They use this system for new homes, however, there are no homes that are ear marked. However, there's a company called Navajo Thaw they work with the Navajo-Hopi Land Commission, they are also requesting funds to help those that don't have a home.

Esther Addakai – when do we apply for it or how do we go about it? We're in the former Bennett Freeze area, some of us we live out of one home.

President Allen Fowler Jr. – this is how the ear mark system works. I am requesting Navajo Thaw for mobile homes because they're asking \$200 million to help those that don't have a home or to help build a home.

- 4. TCRHCC Leila McCabe -
 - Leila McCabe I would like to make a report on what's happening. All service areas are now open at the hospital. For example, before the pandemic we closed a lot of the service department like dental, eye clinic, some of surgical that needed to be done, but, now its all open, just to let you know. And at the same time the hospital is going through some renovations, so you have to ask questions for directions when you get there. COVID-19, I'll give a little report on that, right now we are doing really good we only had 5 quarantine this past week but their all minor cases, they didn't send anybody out. All our testing is kinda of down, you have to go through those triage tent if you want to get tested, just drive in there, its from 8:30 to 4:30, its open. Also, vaccination, last time I mentioned that the percentage is still kinda low 65% younger people, ages 47 and over their percentage is 80%. So, we still need to get the younger ones vaccinated. A question was asked about 16 yrs and older is open, they are getting the Pfizer vaccine. The parent has to accompany the children, they won't let anybody else, you fill out the application for your child or children, then they give the vaccine to the children so remember that. If the grandmother comes with the child, they won't give it to them because it has to be the parents. They say this vaccine is very effective that's why are testing is down but still we need to take precaution just like our Navajo Nation President is really pushing, stressing us to wash our hands, stay distant, avoid gathering, and all the other precaution we are being reminded every day, we still need to follow that. The graduation events are coming up so be careful when you gather with your family. I just want to remind everybody that when you come to the hospital you make sure you get the care you need, if not, ask the doctor, make sure you know where what treatment you are getting. I think we have a lot of complaint. We are really stressing that you ask the doctor, there is Navajo interpreter at the hospital, so you can be treated right. The past week, we celebrated Doctor's Week and Nurses, we gave them some gifts and what not. It would've been nice if the Chapter wrote a letter thanking these Doctors because a lot of them put in overtime and a lot of them were stressed out, especially the Nurses, so, it would be nice to hear from the Chapters. We are in need of Nurses, maybe some of the students are graduating this year, they need to look into getting a Nursing Degree. There are jobs waiting for them here in our own location. Push your young, those that are graduates to go into these fields, so they won't have to go away to find jobs. That's my report for today, and I thank you. If there are any questions, I can take that now.
- 5. TCRHCC Radiation Exposure Natasha Begay

Natasha Begay — Hi this is Natasha Begay on the line from Tuba City Regional Health Care Corporations, Radiation Exposure Screening Program. Thank you for allowing me to present at today's chapter meeting, thank you, chapter officials and chapter community members. Last, I believe the last time I presented, it was an English, and I have a Navajo presentation of our program this time. Our program is providing radiation exposure screening clinic at the hospital every third Thursday of the month. As well as we help, individual too qualify for RECA Radiation Exposure Compensation Act, they are paying out individuals who have been who had been diagnosed with cancer and that and have made, cancer due to radiation exposure from the Down Wind or uranium mine. So, let me play my Navajo presentation for you guys. Audio presentation is playing.

Linda Long – Is this the same place a person would go if they suspect Black Lungs from working in the Coalmine on Peabody, or where can they be directed?

Natasha Begay – I believe for black lungs in under a different program. I know that, I believe its Canyonlands in Page, is the closest. Unfortunately, our program only is dealing with radiation.

6. Arcadian Project - Ron Maldonado

Ron Maldonado - Afternoon or early evening everyone my name is Ron Maldonado. And I work for Westland Resources. We are an archaeological, environmental engineering firm, but we also do archaeology. Really briefly, I live in Fort Defiance Arizona, I've lived on the reservation now for little over thirty years, I'm an in-law and I used to work for the Navajo Nation at the Historic Preservation Department. So, I know area, I know the archaeology very well. The Arcadian Project essentially is a fiber optic project. The project is going to run in different phases. We are working on the first phase, which's Cameron up to Gap along 89 then from Gap and along N20 to LeChee. The fiber optic line will be in the road right away. What the line will do is essentially it will provide the highway in a sense to bring internet to the community, it won't provide internet, but it will be the vehicle to provide the internet. So, essentially what it does is it's a very small line that they did, they use a small trenching machine drops to lying underground and it's all buried. But the main thing is, it's going to provide each chapter the opportunity to work with a provider to bring internet to the chapter. What Arcadian is looking for is a letter of support from the Chapter President in support of the project. I've spoken to Mister Fowler, a week or so ago about this and also gave them a very brief presentation, I don't know if you share that with you. That's essentially the project in a nutshell. We've done archaeological surveys out there. We're making determinations on how to either avoid or whether it's going to be any impact that will also be working, of course with the Preservation Department with the Navajo Nation. I realized that it was really quick. Again, you've to think on the project essentially as we're building the highway and then, the community will find a provider that will build all the other roads that lead to the community homes in the area. So, there's really brief, I think also on the called is Mike Hazel with Arcadian. Mike, I don't know if you're there, he may not be there. So, I don't know if you have any questions for me.

VP Lola Smith – just a note, right up on N20, on this side of the Gap, there's a school, then right on this side of the school, there is a clinic that is being proposed and we'll definitely need this. I don't know if you're aware of this clinic being built.

Ron Maldonado - Yes, I'm aware of the school. I actually did the N20 field work about a month ago. I've noticed they plan on starting construction in the area, I believe, in late June, early July. So, the line itself will bring the opportunity for provider to provide high speed internet to the community. It's essentially a vehicle for the provider. Now they Arcadian Project is going to be in twenty-two chapters across your reservation, it's going to connect into Utah and connect down towards Phoenix, it's a major project. So, this is the first phase here on Navajo that they're working on, it'll connect other chapters, there are five chapters. We're working with LeChee, Coppermine, Gap, Cameron and Tuba City. Those are the first five percent chapters on

the reservation that we're gonna be dealing with, we'll reach out to another seventeen chapters.

President Allen Fowler Jr. – speaks of his meeting with Ron Maldonado with Arcadian Project and NTUA Solar Project. Both will be presented at the next Planning Meeting. Through the American Rescue Plan Act, Navajo Thaw is requesting money to build homes and renovate homes. Chapter will be hiring for the Summer Youth Employment Program which they will help with fixing up within the Chapter House boundaries. Through the American Rescue Plan Act some people will be getting bathroom additions. Thank you to our Office Specialist for keeping the water and trash going and thank you to people that hauled water to those in need of water. VP Lola Smith – Summer students must be ages 14-24 yrs (high school and College) of age for Summer Youth Employment. And I was looking at the calendar, June first or second, one of those two dates there's a holiday, Monday, May 31st. I believe I think Is theres a Tribal Navajo Tribal Holiday right around that time also, does anybody know? I have a question on that. The Chapter is building a Hoop House, we are planting corn, watermelon, squash, these are native seeds, not store-bought seeds that we are planning on planting. With this, I'm thinking of having a Community Feast using the vegetation. This Hoop Houses for everyone, it's through Choice Humanitarian in a partnership with Navajo Thaw. We should all come together as a community for this Hoop House. Most of you are familiar of the clinic that is proposed to be built near Gap school. This clinic is going to employ approximately 200+ employees and looking to build 89 homes for the staff. Because of this proposed clinic, Economic Development is looking into building a Feed Store (like the one at the junction of Hwy 160 and Hwy 98 in Shonto) which will have a laundromat and gas station. This would be good for our community to have along N20. This is what we call Economic Development. JT Willie with Economic Development has set up a virtual meeting tomorrow. Also, the money that is coming from Washington, we have a lot of ear marked things for this money: bathroom addition, warehouse, power line extension, solar, rural addressing, and waterline extension. These ear mark items need proposals. Roylentia and I worked on several proposals which were: bathroom additions, water line extension and warehouse. Our warehouse that we have right now was built, I think in 1950s, it's inadequate for storage. I think a lot of the homes have the powerline extension, meaning that if you live within five miles of a powerline, NTUA can run a powerline to your home, however, you have to apply at NTUA but there is a deadline. Now for solar, this would be for those of you that live further than five miles of a powerline. Rural Addressing, waterline extension. A bathroom addition kinda goes along with the water line extension. If you have a bathroom addition, then there's a need for a water line extension. That ends my report. Esther Addakai – I have a question. If you have a septic tank, do you get a waterline too? Will they run a waterline? I'm asking because a lot of us have septic tanks. If we want a waterline, can we get that? So, we don't have to be hauling water.

VP Lola Smith – As far as I know, if there's a water line that's going to go near you, you will get a water line.

Lavern Tsosie – I have a few questions or statements, I guess. This water issue. Well, first of all with the power lines, they said, it's not five miles, you have to be within one mile. With me, I barely made it under a mile, and they approved it for the power poles to be installed. I have like, maybe nine power poles that are going to be linked up to where I live right now, my home stead. So, it's within a mile not five miles, I just wanted to clarify that one. Also, there's so many

people out there, men and women who have no homesite lease, and have been living there for many years. They have no knowledge, of where to go or how to do it or no one is there for them to get these done. We have to try to get the information from them again, and they don't like, their hesitant to give the information to try to help them out. I tried to help a few people out. Some don't want to disburse their information to other people. Even though you're asking you're wanting to help them out. So, I did a few people, but I tried to update on their situation or the status every time, but there's conflicts in between who is going to get the septic tanks and who's gonna actually get the water tanks. I've asked IHS, then they tell me when they say it's probably in probate, when somebody used to live in that house, or that person is deceased. Very hard for them to get at least now because it's either a probate or no probate or whatever the situation might be in the household. Some may be stingy with the house or there's family conflicts. So, it's very hard to get this homesite lease. Why's it so difficult? Chapter House could verify that these people live there. Let it go. Why do we have to have all this paperwork? Yes, in my situation, I'm a newbie, I came home I'd got my homesite lease, yes, I can follow the instructions, I can follow the criteria and all that stuff. But for those that have lived here for many years, they don't want to go through this stuff again, there is so much paperwork. Then, they got tired of being asked to these things. So, is there a way we can just say, you know what this person lived here for the past fifty years? Oh, go ahead and get that water line out there. Without having to put that person in more distress and going here and there and trying to get last minute water, I need a bathroom. I'm ready and willing to go to make this bathroom for this person, there's none, that's even a long waiting list. Like I said, in previous meetings some of these people have been waiting for bathroom editions for over ten years. Some of the materials are have been wasted inside their house. It has to be remodeled again or restructured or, resurveyed and reassessed to make sure that the bathroom is good to go. So, on that end, I just wanted to mention that part and just made me think about a solution that we can come up with, so we can just give names to whoever is responsible or taking charge of the water lines say, yes, these people just get them water, that's it.

President Allen Fowler Jr. – do you have a response Madam VP or do you want me to do it? Any Chapter, even NTUA have their own policies and procedures that they go by. These are not our rules; however, we do have to honor their policies and procedures.

Grazing Official Stanford Fowler – for homesite lease, you have to apply. It requires a lot of paperwork along with policies and procedures, it is a long process. Same way with the power and waterline. If you live too far from either, we have other alternatives that can used. We are working on making this procedure less complicated. It would make it easier if we had a DOJ in Tuba City, but for now the current DOJ is located in Window Rock.

Linda Long - Alright. I just wanted to make a comment to what Laverne has been talking about and what Stanley talked about too. My family and I, we went through that exempt. Any home that had been built about nineteen sixty-seven and down lower than that. That was exempt at the time, but we were told at the Land Office that we had to pay for our archaeological survey and all that stuff up because you have to pay for that. They will give you the home site, yes, but you have to pay for the archeological clearance. That's what went through it. I just wanted to comment on that. Thank you.

Delegate Paul Begay – this homesite lease, there's a lot of issues with waterlines, powerlines are all under NTUA. One way that we can help you, Jerry Williams and I, we can have somebody from NTUA join our meeting, the next meeting. We can ask questions, that's what is called Technical Assistance, they are the ones that have all the answers. At the Chapter level, there's a lot of questions, and not all our questions are answered. So, we need to line up a call from NTUA and the Land Department, Mike Halona. This is how we can help you; we will contact the Land Department and NTUA so we can have these questions answered. Thank you, President.

President Allen Fowler Jr. – you might want to include the water department too. Delegate Paul Begay – Yes, we'll include the Water Department, Mr. Jason John or one of the representatives can be contacted. Thank you.

President Allen Fowler Jr. – Thank you again for your comment and for info on for Land Department, NTUA and Water Department, Delegate Begay.

Secretary/Treasurer Delores Dempsey - No report. Thank you.

3. Grazing Officials Stanford Fowler – I've been driving around visiting people around the community.
